

While state funding has increased by \$1,572 per student for all other districts, CPS's state funding has decreased by \$459 per student






Even though CPS' share of state enrollment has remained flat at 20%, its share of state funding has declined every year







Even though other districts' share of state enrollment has remained flat at 80%, their share of state funding has increased every year
